The Toronto Workshop that was held back in November was truly enjoyable in all the ways you would expect.

There was a warm welcome for out-of-town participants, not only on the dance floor but during breaks and lunchtime. The facilities at Bishop Strachan School were perfect, and the food was plentiful and delicious, but above all it was the friendliness of people that made the day outstanding.

Of course we practised our dancing: footwork, figures and friendliness were all emphasized in due measure. There were three teachers working with us: one from far away (Graham Donald from Scotland), one from nearby (Elizabeth McMahon from Peterborough), and one local (Moira Korus from Toronto). Each of the three class levels had a turn with each teacher, so that we received the benefit of three perspectives on how to improve our dancing. We were reminded to keep our footwork nice, which is good because this is easy to neglect but does make the dancing more beautiful. I remember learning some figures that were new for me: allemande left and allemande right, and contra chase. There were some interesting twists on familiar figures also, as they were featured in the new dances that we learned. As for friendliness, the teachers' appeals to make eye contact and smile were hardly even necessary, since we were all having such a good time during classes.

Best of all was that after the morning sessions, we danced in the afternoon to the music of Scotch Mist joined by Fred Moyes. They were fabulous as always. From 2 until 5 pm we put in practice all that we had learned, and danced to our heart's content. Well, actually we could have gladly continued, but ran out of time. However, this is one of the good things about the Toronto Workshop: a person who has driven from London can be happily home by 8 pm on Saturday night.

I'm grateful to the Bursary Committee for their assistance covering the cost of the workshop. When I applied, they assured me that they are eager to subsidize out-of-town workshops now, as well as Summer School as they have done in the past. I'd encourage everyone to consider attending such a fun and educational event.

The Story Behind a Dance

The Piper and the Penguin (R88) Sq. Set R Goldring Scotia Suite

Gilbert Kerr was a member of the crew of the ship "Scotia" on the Scottish National Antarctic Expedition of 1902-04, which was organised and led by Dr. William S. Bruce. A blizzard forced the ship onto an ice shelf where it was stuck for seven days. To pass the time, Kerr, the official piper of the Expedition, decided to test the effect of music on the penguins found there. They showed "no signs of appreciation or disapproval, only sleepy indifference". Kerr was photographed performing in full Highland dress in the harsh Antarctic environment. The Emperor penguin accompanying him in this photograph was tied to a large cooking pot packed full of snow to keep him in place. This shot was made into a postcard, and became one of the first items ever to be posted from Antarctica. It was later made into a British stamp to commemorate the occasion.

Dear Questioning Quentin,


This formation is like a Grand Chain for two couples facing each other across a set (a square). Each person should take a handshake hold, shoulder height of the shorter dancer, giving hands as you give eye contact to the opposite dancer. It is very important to release their hand as you pass so you do not drag hands down or pull their arm out of its' socket. You have 2 bars for each side of the square, so you have time to dance an oval track around each other making eye contact and keeping your arms nicely extended (elbows down) until you pass that person. Start with the right hand, then turn and repeat with the next dancer left hand and the next dancer right hand. On bars 7 and 8, you will change places, left hand, with person of same sex and person in first man's position or second ladies' position will do a polite turn into original place. This is a social formation so gracious manners should be apparent. You will be amazed at how much more enjoyable a dance can be when all participants are working together and smiling!

Peanut Crunch Frozen Dessert

2 liters vanilla ice cream 1 liter Cool Whip 350 ml (1.5 cups) peanut butter 150 grams (3 bars) crushed Crispy Crunch (half used in mixture, other half sprinkled on top)

Soften ice cream enough to be able to mix ice cream, Cool Whip, peanut butter and half of Crispy Crunch together.

Spread into 13" x 9" pan. Sprinkle other half of crushed Crispy Crunch on top.

Put in freezer.




Dancing Around the World

Robbie Burns Day - January 25th




A red red Rose

Robert Burns



Robert Burns was born to a poor farming family January 25, 1759 in Alloway, Scotland. He was the oldest of seven children and demonstrated signs of exceptional writing ability at a very young age. His book titled *Poems, Chiefly in the Scottish Dialect* was published in 1786 and was a huge success. He moved to Edinburgh and was welcomed into high society. He continued writing until his death on July 21, 1796 in Dumfries at 37 years of age. He is credited with 559 poems or songs and is one of Scotland's most important literary figures. Burns is famous for his political views, revolutionary behaviour and his love of the lassies. He was also inspired by the beauty of Scotland. Robert Burns remains one of the most celebrated figures in history and has a worldwide following.

When asked for the source of his greatest creative inspiration, American singer songwriter Bob Dylan selected Burns' 1794 song *A Red, Red Rose*, as the lyrics that have had the biggest effect on his life. Click <u>here</u> to listen to a rendition of this song by Andy M. Stewart.
